HELP ESTABLISH A

SALEM SUSTAINABILITY COMMISSION Sustainability means making decisions that do not deprive future generations of their right to make similar decisions. In theological terms, it means exercising stewardship of Creation on behalf of not only ourselves, but also unborn generations. In political terms, it means tempering a wide spectrum of government decisions with the values of the "triple bottom line" – people, planet and profit.

The triple bottom line is based on the understanding that human welfare, planetary ecology and economics are inter-related: they depend upon each other. We cannot be healthy if our environment is degraded or if we are too poor. The economy will soon decline if we do not protect both human health and planetary health. Therefore, we need to seek lifestyles and economic models that protect the planet and meet the needs of all those living on it.

The city governments of Portland, Corvallis and Eugene have realized this and have established Sustainability

Commissions in order help both their governments and their people to understand these inter-connections and to make collective decisions that take the triple bottom line into account. Now there is an effort to introduce the same wisdom into Salem's public life. The commission will advise the Council about how sustainability should influence many different kinds of decisions the Council makes. In addition, it will partner with existing organizations in Salem to educate the public about the broad range of sustainability issues.

HEAR YE, HEAR YE! ABOUT THOSE ANNOUNCEMENTS IN CHURCH...

We love our Life of the Community Time in Church (at least most of us do!). It brings alive the heart of our congregation as we have a chance to learn about all the opportunities our church provides for service, learning, fellowship and even fundraising. And it's nice sometimes to hear from the people directly involved in our activities rather than have the pastors make all the announcements. Yet we also prefer services that are less than an hour and fifteen minutes in length! And so, as with all parts of our service, we strive to be mindful about the length of the Life of the Community. Recognizing that we haven't really put forth guidelines for making announcements, the pastors, supported by the Deacons, would like to request that people approach making announcements with the following in mind:

- 1. Up to three people in any one service are invited to make announcements on a first come, first served basis—the pastors are more than happy to make a brief announcement for you if you are not one of the first three to ask. Those making announcements are requested to come to the front of the church when we begin the Life of the Community so that we don't have lag time between announcements.
- 2. An announcement is an opportunity to share basic information about an event or activity in the life of the church—think "who, what, when, where, how."

- Longer appeals that aim to move the heart and provide a larger context for understanding your event or activity can sometimes be offered in a Moment for Mission (speak to a pastor about this) and certainly in the Shalom newsletter.
- 3. Please keep your announcements to less than one minute.
- 4. All of us can contribute to keeping the Life of the Community manageable by reading the printed announcements in the bulletin and subscribing electronically to "This Week," so that fewer of them have to be repeated verbally in worship.

We hope that following these guidelines will preserve the heart and purpose of our Life of the Community time in worship while honoring everyone's need for reasonable service length. Thank you for your cooperation!

DRINK WATER FOR LIFE

"On the Way to Wagouma" Excerpts of an article by Susan Smith

I went to Haiti over Spring Break and Holy Week. I visited water systems we had funded in Carre Savanne, Pedosant and Te Kase. But the place that stole my heart and burdens my soul is a place called Wagouma. Wagouma is an area high in the mountains of Haiti, halfway between Hinche, the capitol of the Central Plateau, and the border of the Dominican Republic...

The spring in Wagouma serves 14 communities with an estimated 700 families (about 4000-4500 people) and their livestock. Women and children walk as much as four hours to the spring, driving donkeys with water buckets dangling off

their sides or bulls with water buckets hung on their horns. Then they wait to fill their buckets, sometimes hours. Finally, they return home after another four hour walk. This is their daily routine during the six months or so of the dry season from October to March. During the rainy season, they can draw water from tiny springs far closer to home.

The water at Wagouma is clear, but not clean, because it is contaminated both by animal waste and by the shared means of filling water buckets. Before, just a few years ago, only children died of the diseases communicated through dirty water. But then cholera came to Haiti and since then adults, young healthy adults, die also. So far more than 400 people from Wagouma have died from cholera. The traces of their deaths are found in the slight mounds along the side of the road, ringed with rocks. The most recent deaths in Wagouma were just three months ago, when three members of a family succumbed to cholera, no doubt contracted through this dirty water....

Apart from the 400 cholera deaths in the last three years, perhaps 80 children die each year from the dirty water. If we could fund a spring cap and reservoir at Wagouma, we could save at least 2000 lives over the life of the system – at a cost of less than \$10 per life. Ten dollars...
