These are the tribes with whom we are walking together even today: the Kalapuya , tribes that include Tualatin (Atfalati), Yamhill (Yamel), Ahantchuyuk (Pudding River), Luckiamute, Santiam, Chepenefa (Mary's River), Chemapho (Muddy Creek), Tsankupi (Calapooia River), Mohawk (Mohawk River, OR; unrelated to the Mohawks of NY), Chafan (near Eugene), Chelamela (Long Tom River), Winefelly (Mohawk, McKenzie and Coast Forks of the Willamette River), and the Yoncalla peoples.

About today's keyboard music: The folk tune known as "Dove of Peace" was first set to a hymn text in the 1835 collection *Southern Harmony*. It has subsequently been set with a number of other texts, including that of our Communion hymn, "I Come with Joy." The offertory and postlude are both based on spirituals, in recognition of the beginning of Black History Month. Emma Lou Diemer's setting of "There is a Balm in Gilead" is a tone painting of the text, alternating quiet sections for the words of reassurance of the refrain, with louder, more agitated sections for the words of distress and discouragement of the verses. The spiritual "Didn't My Lord Deliver Daniel" refers to the Biblical story of Daniel in the lion's den, and was sung by slaves as a connection with God and affirming their belief that they would someday be freed.

Bell Choir Anniversary

Did you know that 50 years ago a church member presented our congregation with the first two octaves (25 bells) of Handbells? Now we have a total of 62 bells!

In celebration of this anniversary, we would like those who are interested - and can read music - to join us for a rehearsal in early February.
